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

Humans are cultured beings endowed with morals and intellect



Human societies and cultures around the world have values, social systems, and artifacts that are considered valuable in their lives. They establish social order, follow patterns as distinctive and unique traditions, and contain universal values







With the abilities they possess, humans are naturally capable of living socially, adapting to their surrounding environment, and building unique and distinctive civilizations and cultures





Rituals as cultural identity and cultural heritage

Every universal element of culture has rituals that carry symbolic meaning within social, cultural, and religious contexts. A ritual is a series of patterned actions and a symbolic system, formally organized or established as tradition, to carry out the course of life—whether in the relationship between humans and God or other supreme realities, between humans themselves, or between humans and their environment





Ruwatan Sapuh Leger is one example of a ritual in Bali

The Ruwatan Wayang Sapuh Leger ritual attracts attention from various groups, not only from parents whose children are born in the Wayang week but also from stakeholders, the community, and the government. This phenomenon has gained more attention because it is related to life attitudes, belief systems, and suggestions that raise various concerns about life attitudes in response to conditions perceived as threatening on a spiritual level

It attracts widespread attention because it is related to belief systems




Mass ruwatan to reduce the community's costs

Belief in Time and Space



Bali recognizes the culture of sacred space and time



A child born in the Wayang week is considered vulnerable to misfortune



It is believed that there will be a threat from Bhatara Kala



A ruwatan is performed to avoid danger.



Temporal: every 210 days (Tumpek Wayang)
Cosmological: to avoid dangers during transitional times
Spiritual: therapy for the soul, purification, and
sanctification

The Lontar of SapuhLeger

The story of Sang Hyang Kala and Rare Kumara.
Kala wanted to devour his younger sibling who was born in the Wayang week.


The Dalang saved Kumara through a performance.
Kala was defeated and granted the authority to hold a ceremony for the purification of human souls



The Meaning of Sapuh Leger

- Sapuh = cleansing/ruwatan
- Leger = mala/birthborne impurities
- Wayang Sapuh Leger = sacred ceremony for the purification of the soul.
